Identification of Family Law Orders

Interim orders are generally Chambers' orders and final orders are orders after trial.

Few family matters proceed to trial. Most interim orders as a result are, in effect, final orders.

Orders made in case management or after a Chambers' application, will be called "orders", without a designation of interim or final. The preamble must indicate whether the order was made in case management or after a Chambers' application. Orders made after a trial shall be called final orders.

In some cases, counsel may wish to clarify that an order is final after a Chambers' application and in those cases they should make that request of the court.
